confluence *n.* 1: a coming or flowing together, meeting, or gathering at one point 2: a flowing together of two or more streams 3: the combined stream formed by conjunction, e.g. the Ohio river formed by the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers; "the lost generation" formed by American expatriates and post World War I Europe; the Bloomsbury group; Andy Warhol's Factory; the **2007 international convention** formed by the members of **Sigma Tau Delta** and the city of **Pittsburgh**.

Need a Roommate?

The HILTON PITTSBURGH is ideally located at the POINT, where the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers merge to form the Ohio river (the site of the Fort Pitt Museum). Crossing the Warhol or Clemente bridges will bring you to the North Shore, site of the Andy Warhol Museum, PNC Park (home of the Pittsburgh Pirates), Heinz Field (home of the Pittsburgh Steelers), and the Carnegie Science Center, as well as a host of eateries. A short trip on the T, our rapid rail system, will bring you to Station Square and the South Side, both lively train station, are there for dining, as well as half a dozen other restaurants. At Station Square you can take the incline to the top of Mt. Washington for more eating spots and spectacular views of the entire city. A short walk up Penn Avenue from the hotel will bring you to the Cultural District, home to four major theaters providing a variety of stage events. The Cabaret at Theatre Square usually hosts a show you can enjoy with or without food. And a short bus ride or longer walk past the Convention Center will take you to the Strip District (named for the strips of warehouses off the river), home of the Heinz History and Sports Museum as well as restaurants, clubs, and open markets. For the more adventurous there's nearby Oakland and the unbelevable Carnegie Museums of Art and Natural History. Whether dining at the World Famous Primate Brothers (featuring on The Food Network) or taking a river boat cruise around the city, visitors to our city quickly realize how much Pittsburgh has to offer.



David Rakoff is the author of two books, *Fraud* and *Don't Get Too Comfortable*, and is a regular contributor to NPR's "This American Life." You've likely read his work in *Esquire*, *Vogue*, *The New York Times Magazine* and *Gourmet*. His beautifully crafted essays are often funny and biting observations about contemporary American life.

Jim Daniels, the Thomas Stockman Baker Professor of English and director of the creative writing program at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, is the author of nine books of poems, including *Show and Tell: New and Selected Poems* (2003), which was a finalist for the Paterson Poetry Prize. His most recent work is *Street* (2005), a book of poems accompanying the photographs of Charlee Brodsky. *Mr. Pleasant*, his third book of short stories, will be published in 2007.

All official Convention activities will take place in the Hilton Pittsburgh. Located at 600 Commonwealth Place, the hotel is one of the city's largest, most recognized hotels, ideally situated in downtown Pittsburgh and adjacent to Point State Park and Pittsburgh's famed Three Rivers (the "confluence").

Make your reservations no later than March 6, 2007. Room rates are \$109 per night for singles/doubles/triples/quads (excluding taxes). Airport Shuttle The Express Shuttle ticket desk that is located in the baggage claim area (next to the Thrifty Rental Car desk) charges \$34 (\$32 for students with school ID card) for a roundtrip fare to the Hilton. No reservations are necessary. The shuttle leaves the airport every 30 minutes from 7:00 AM to 11:00 PM. each day. For the return trip to the airport, Express Shuttle picks up at the Hilton at 15 minutes before the hour starting at 4:45 AM until 9:45 PM.
